NEXT STEP 2016 DESTINATIONS OF 2015 YEAR 12s Toogoolawah State High School



Introduction

This page presents a summary of results of the annual *Next Step* survey for Toogoolawah State High School. The *Next Step* survey, undertaken by the Queensland Government, targets all students who completed Year 12 and gained a Senior Statement in 2015, whether they attended a state, Catholic or independent school, or a TAFE secondary college. The Queensland Government Statistician's Office conducted the survey between March and June 2016, approximately six months after the young people left school. Responses were collected online and via computer-assisted telephone interviewing.

Response rate for Toogoolawah State High School

Table 1 below reports the response rate for Toogoolawah State High School. It expresses the number of respondents from this school, as a percentage of all Year 12 completers who attended Toogoolawah State High School in 2015.

It has not been possible to ascertain how representative these responses are of all Year 12 completers from this school.

Definitions of main destinations

The pathways of Year 12 completers were categorised into ten main destinations. Year 12 completers who were both studying and working were reported as studying for their main destination. A table defining these categories can be found in the statewide report at www.education.qld.gov.au/nextstep.

Summary of findings

In 2016, 53.8% of young people who completed Year 12 at Toogoolawah State High School in 2015 continued in some recognised form of education and training in the year after they left school.

The most common study destination was Bachelor Degree (30.8%). The combined VET study destinations accounted for 23.1% of respondents, including 19.2% in campus-based VET programs, with 11.5% of Year 12 completers entering programs at Certificate IV level or higher.

3.8% commenced employment-based training, all as trainees.

In addition to the above study destinations, a further 3.8% of respondents from this school deferred a tertiary offer in 2016 (deferrers are included in their current destination).

46.2% did not enter post-school education or training, and were either employed (23.1%), seeking work (15.4%) or not in the labour force, education or training (7.7%).
